2002		A local consultation exercise is set up by Stirling Council culminating in a Community Action Plan with the creation of a membership based Development Trust (DDT) to coordinate activity.
2003	 Company and charity status is achieved and membership stands at 200 Ochlochy Pond is refurbished 	
2004	The Midweek Group (MWG) volunteers embark on bench & railing refurbishment, and provision of town centre Christmas Lighting.	Fundamental in Bloom (DIB) established and win 'Best New Entrant' in the Scotland in Bloom competition
2005	 Membership stands at 500 DDT takes over management of the Braeport Community Centre which becomes our registered office and working base. 	
2006	The Memorial Bridge replaced by Army Engineers with funding from Stirling Council following close working between DDT and the Dunblane section of the Royal British Legion of Scotland.	

2007	Dunblane starts receiving annual community benefit grants from the Braes of Doune Windfarm ; and establishes a committee to allocate this income to community groups.	
2009	A Scottish Government grant of £1.2m is received to construct a High Street building; later named Riverview. This includes 5 flats and business space to increase footfall in the town centre, create jobs, provide low cost housing and provide community income to fund future projects. DDT Projects Ltd (DDTPL), a company wholly owned by the DDT, is set up to manage this project.	<image/>
2010	MWG volunteers complete repainting of the Faery Bridge	Dunblane Environment Group (DEG) formed to focus on improving the Memorial Garden and commence the creation of a 250 metre-long hosta border.
2012	Glen Road walking cycle path saved from closure by a joint venture between involving DDT, Sustrans and Bridge of Allan Community Council and is now an important link in National Cycle Network 765.	

2013		The Environment Group begins lobbying Stirling Council to repair the riverside path below the Cathedral which collapsed in 2011.
2014	With Dunblane Community Council, we procure Scottish Government funding to run a community managed Town Centre Charrette .	The Charrette involved consultation with local people on the priorities they have for improving the town centre.
2015	 We take on a 25 year full repairing lease for the Braeport Community Centre with a Braeport Committee taking responsibility for managing the building, bookings and an agreed business plan. Short-term project staff are employed to provide support in the areas of strategic planning and fundraising. Dunblane in Bloom continues to offer attractive floral displays in containers and beds around the town, including the stunning rock garden adjacent to the Faery Bridge. 	<image/>

2016	 The riverside path repair is finally completed through collaboration between the DDTPL and Stirling Council. 3 years of funding from the Scottish Government's "Strengthening Communities" scheme commences to develop our ability to manage the organisation and apply for funding. An administrator and funding officer are appointed. Websites are established for DDT and the Braeport Centre. The volunteer Paths Maintenance Team is formed and carries out work on the Darn Road and in the 'Darn Road' Path. 	<image/>	
2017	 Braeport Memory Café opens as a service to local people with dementia and their families and carers Stirling Council agrees to transfer ownership of the Braeport Centre to DDT on behalf of the community Major energy upgrade to the Braeport Centre commences with a £93k grant from Climate Challenge Fund for new windows, doors, insulation and energy efficiency
